Evangelical Lutheran Church in America April 2024

I announced the following information in church to both congregations and during the children's sermon on March 17. I shared it with the confirmation class on March 20 and plan to share it with the BLAST group on March 27. My hope is through this newsletter, it will be shared with the larger communities of Nazareth and United.

I had gestational diabetes when I was pregnant with my son. When I delivered him, as it is usual, the diabetes went away. Two years later (2002) I was diagnosed as a Type 1 (T1D) diabetic and began insulin injections at that time. Twelve years ago I began wearing an insulin pump and six years ago I paired that with a continuous glucose monitor (CGM), a wearable device that checks my blood sugar throughout the day. In 2020 I had two diabetic ketoacidosis (DKA) episodes with the last one being potentially fatal with my sugars measuring at 1620. At that time, I began the process of applying for a diabetic alert dog. Diabetic alert dogs - affectionately known as DADs - are trained to let the diabetic know when their blood sugar has spiked too high or dropped too low. This way, action can be taken before the problem turns into a medical emergency.

There are various ways that the dog can alert their human of a low or high blood sugar and these skills require rigorous training from professional service dog trainers. The trainer for my diabetic alert dog is located in California.

DADs are able to alert the diabetic by reacting to particular smells that are emitted from the human body due to chemical shifts in the diabetic which are undetected by a human nose. My DAD has been trained using samples of saliva from a "scent collection kit" I provided to the trainer. This way my DAD has been learning my body chemistry during his training. The samples were taken when I had low blood sugar, high blood sugar and normal blood sugar levels. Dogs are rewarded during training every time they detect the change in the blood sugar sample.

Studies have found that diabetic alert dogs are successful in alerting up to 10 minutes before the CGM or pump alerts. This means that they detect changes in their owners when those people have no symptoms and would not otherwise know the rise or fall in the blood sugar.

Another benefit of having a diabetic alert dog is to improve my blood sugar control. My diabetic alert dog can't replace responsible individual management of my diabetes. I will still need to monitor and treat my blood sugar regularly.

In addition to being on alert for blood sugar malfunctions, diabetic alert dogs are known to provide a tremendous amount of love and emotional support to its owner, resulting in an increased sense of security and balance in the daily life of someone with T1D. The important thing is that the dog is trained to be a working animal. A service dog is not considered a pet and is required for daily life functions and activities. My service

dog will be identified by wearing a service dog vest, letting the public know that it is a service dog.

My diabetic alert dog is named Drifter. He is a black lab and turned 1 in December. Knowing the environments I may find myself in, Drifter has been trained in all levels of schools including college, church services, in public settings and in office settings. We had initially planned for him to come to me this fall; however, he is ready now. I will travel to California for 2-3 days in April in order for Drifter and I to meet and become acquainted. Then his trainer and the owner of the company will travel back to Iowa with Drifter and I for approximately a week. This time will be spent on acclimating Drifter to my environment and "tweaking" any training.

Drifter will be with me at all times – office hours, church services (Sunday, funerals, weddings), nursing home/assisted living/homebound visits, classes (confirmation/BLAST). This has been a learning process for me (and Jim as well) and I am fully aware it will be a learning process for both congregations and communities. I welcome any questions or comments you may have. I look forward to my family and our churches to grow by 4 paws in April!
